Pandemic-EBT helps families feed their kids

When schools closed due to the COVID-19 pandemic, hundreds of thousands of Minnesota's students lost access to school breakfast and lunch. For students who receive free & reduced price school meals, this has been a big gap in their access to food.

The USDA recently approved the state of Minnesota's application for Pandemic EBT (P-EBT) to help families replace the meals their children lost because schools are closed.

What do you get?

P-EBT is a payment \$325 per student now and an extra \$100 per student in August.

Who is eligible for P-EBT?

A lot of Minnesota's students are eligible. Families with children ages 5-18 as of Sept. 1, 2019 are eligible for P-EBT if your child's school is closed due to COVID-19 and:

You were receiving SNAP or MFIP benefits as of March 18, 2020;

Your child was receiving free or reduced-price school meals during the 2019-2020 school year;

Your child is enrolled in a school that offers free school meals to all students regardless of the family's income.

Students in district-run pre-K programs who were receiving free or reduced-price school meals are also eligible.

How do you get P-EBT?


P-EBT is being issued two ways:

Families who were already on SNAP or MFIP on March 18, 2020 have already had the \$325 per child loaded on their EBT card.





Families who were receiving free or reduced-price meals or attending a school that offers free meals to all students **need to apply** for P-EBT. You will be mailed a black and white EBT card that is loaded with \$325 per student.

Hurry! Applications must be completed by July 31, 2020!

What can P-EBT be used to buy?

You can use P-EBT to buy the same things regular SNAP benefits buy. Most food items are eligible:













Fruits and Meat, Fish, Eggs, Vegetables and Dairy

Honey and Maple Products

Jams, Jellies, Pickles, and Sauces

Baked Goods

The benefits "expire" 365 days after they are issued.

Will getting P-EBT make me a public charge?

Even though P-EBT uses the same type of card as SNAP, P-EBT is NOT SNAP benefits and is not considered in a public charge test.

My family does not have access to the internet or a computer. Can we submit a paper application? An *online* application must be completed between June 8, 2020, and July 31, 2020 at mn.p-ebt.org.
